

The worst thing for a Christian to imagine is that God has abandoned them. Here, in these words, we find the opposite. Christ tells us not to fear the pain and death of the flesh but fear the one who can take your soul into death. With Christ, there is only life after His death. And for us, we have this resurrection life for all eternity.

## Reformation Day Reflection by Pr. Brian Thomas

Almighty and gracious Lord, pour out Your Holy Spirit on Your faithful people. Keep us steadfast in Your grace and truth, protect and deliver us in times of temptation, defend us against all enemies, and grant to Your Church Your saving peace; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

- Collect for Reformation Day

The Church year is a cycle of festivals and seasons. Churches around the world and throughout history have shaped their faith and marked their lives by these events. Together we will pray the collect above on Sunday, October 25th, as we Lutherans celebrate the anniversary of the Reformation. The color is red to signify the work of the Holy Spirit. During this time, we give thanks to God for providentially leading an Augustinian monk and Hebrew scholar to a deeper understanding of the Gospel. Through his preaching and pen, Martin Luther brought attention to a corrupted Medieval papacy and church, who had turned the Gospel into a money-making endeavor through the selling of indulgences. While he simply wanted to reform the doctrine and practice of the church from within, Luther was deemed a heretic and officially excommunicated by the pope. The Lutheran movement, against all odds, grew like a California wildfire and spread throughout Europe with the help of the printing press and the protection of his Saxon prince.

This year as we celebrate this monumental moment in history I would like you to reflect on your own attachment to the Lutheran tradition. Why are you Lutheran?

Some of you are life-long Lutherans. You were literally born into it, baptized, raised, confirmed, and still remain. Thanks be God! Others, myself included, were drawn to the tradition for a variety of reasons: marriage, liturgy, doctrine, convenient location of a local parish, day school, etc. Whether you are a cradle Lutheran or a brand new convert, I am glad you are here.

We have been studying the work of C.S. Lewis at our Wednesday study. In his book, Mere Christianity, Lewis likens the Christian church to a large house with many rooms, each representing a different tradition of the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. While his desire was to draw people into the hallway for discussion on our shared faith, he encouraged his readers to settle down in one of the rooms. "But it is in the rooms, not in the hall, that there are fires and chairs and meals. The hall is a place to wait in, a place from which to try the various doors, not a place to live in" (xv).



I did not grow up in the church; therefore, I took Lewis' advice by exploring the Christian house quite thoroughly as a young man, trying various doors in search of a room to call my own. I attended non-denominational churches, Baptist churches, and even spent a few years in the Presbyterian church. For a short while, I attended an Anglican graduate school of studies called Cranmer Theological House as I fancied myself one day becoming a church historian. It was here that my studies led me to the works of Martin Luther, Phillip Melanchthon, and Martin Chemnitz. At this point, I crossed the hall and entered the Lutheran room, where I remain to this day.

I am often asked, "Why Lutheranism?" My answer, "I am a Lutheran because I believe it is the most biblically faithful room in the house." While I do not consider our tradition or synod to be perfect, it remains the most scripturally sound church this side of heaven in my humble opinion. However you ended up here in the room called "Lutheran," let me encourage you to really explore all our room has to offer. Settle into a comfy chair and read some of our theology, listen to a Lutheran podcast or radio program, attend Sunday school or a Wednesday Bible study if you are able, and soak up all that our blessed tradition provides when it comes to the teaching of Holy Scripture.

### FUN FACTS ABOUT THE REFORMATION



- 1. The word 'Protestantism' originates from German princes issuing a 'protest' against the Holy Roman Emperor, Charles V.
- 2. Martin Luther (1483 1546) was the most influential figure of the Reformation.
- 3. Luther's ninety-five thesis represented the symbolic start of the Protestant Reformation in 1517.
- 4. 'Justification by faith alone' or Sola Fide in Latin is at the core of the new Lutheran ethic.
- 5. Pope Leo X's Papal Bull of 1520, Exsurge Domine, was the first response from the papacy condemning Luther.
- 6. The Edict of Worms declared Luther an obstinate heretic and banned the reading or possession of his writings.
- 7. Guttenberg's revolutionary printing press was central to the spread of new protestant ideas.
- 8. The burgeoning spirit of learning as part of the Renaissance period made people question traditional thought. The driving thought was "ad fontes," meaning, go back to the original documents, like Holy Scripture.
- 9. The Catholic Church responded via their own 'Counter-Reformation'.
- 10. The Bible was translated from Latin into vernacular languages across Europe.

### From Our Council President



Fellow Grace Lutheran Members,

I want to take a few moments to provide an update on the giving at Grace during 2020. As you all know, this has been an extraordinary and challenging year, not only for Grace Lutheran and our community here in San Diego but for the entire nation and indeed the world.

Despite the challenges many of us are facing, which may include sickness of family or friends, loss or reduction of income, feelings of fear, loneliness or simply being disconnected, or political unrest, we are all able to take comfort that we have a God that will never forsake us. As we hear in Isaiah 41:

Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

To deal with struggle and just from his beneficence, God has provided the Word, his Son, and to each of us earthly time, talents, and treasures. The Christian belief is that these earthly things are not ours and biblically, our role is likened to that of a custodian. In other words, there is a mission to our goods and time that transcends us. It's s subset of the broader Christian challenge to deny one's self.

Recently, we asked GLC members to prayerfully consider moving up on level in giving, with the short-term goal of erasing unexpected deficits related to the preschool closure and the long-term goal of establishing independence from preschool revenue. I can tell you that the congregation has shown extraordinary generosity over the past six months despite the restrictions on gathering and the challenging economic environment that we have faced. It's a little early to say how we're all responding to the step-up challenge, but I am encouraged that giving does seem to have increased to some extent Certainly we should all be grateful that it remains strong in any event.

For example, through the end of August in 2019, received offerings for Grace were \$170k. The approved budget for 2020 called for giving of \$176k through the end of August. The actual offerings were \$178,792! This is even though attendance was down roughly 50% due to the impact of the virus and government restrictions. It's truly a blessing that such generosity and faithfulness has been evident during this difficult time. The \$2700 in additional giving over budget is good progress. Of course, to close a projected budget deficit of \$22K by the end of the year, we're hoping the faithful and those with the means can further respond in the next 3 months.

There are many ways to adjust giving in the short run. You can take an amount of money you've laid up as savings and devote an amount of it to the church's immediate need. You can give from earnings if you're well employed. You can take the Lenten approach and deny yourself some treasured luxury temporarily. As you know, we have encouraged each family to prayerfully consider moving up a rung on the giving ladder. If you haven't done so, we encourage you and your families to engage in this cognitive and meditational exercise, if only to reassess priorities and remain grateful for all the blessings we receive every day as members of the body of Christ.

On a personal note, we in the Houts family miss seeing you all, seeing your faces, and hearing your voices raised in praise and can't wait for this COVID cup to pass from our lips. Our thoughts and prayers are with each of you and we humbly request your prayers for our family, for our Pastor, and for the Elders and Council Members who are working to navigate the challenges of the day for Grace Lutheran. But we all need to be reminded that our present struggles are the challenges of a day and not some sort of dark destiny. In the words of the Psalmist, God's word is a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path. And an old hymn puts it this way:

Lead, kindly light. Keep thou my feet. I do not ask to see the distant scene. One step enough for me.

### AND FROM OUR TRUSTEE

Several projects are ongoing at Grace and one big project has been completed. Here is an update:

- The sanctuary roof has had serious leakage problems for years. This has been mostly located in the large north side section. We had repaired this section several times. Last winter we again had a problem in two areas of that section. So, we decided to replace the entire section. Heavy-duty underlayment was used and all of the tiles were reinstalled using a method that requires fewer nails through the roof. So now we can all pray for rain!
- The downspout and gutters on the preschool building, which caused serious flooding in the classrooms costing over \$1,000 to remediate, have been corrected as well.
- Other ongoing major projects are the enhancement of the video security system. So far we
  have used the video to identify illegal dumping activities alongside our dumpsters. The enhanced
  system will provide more comprehensive coverage of the sanctuary and the parsonage.
- While some projects had been placed on hold, normal maintenance has continued largely unhampered.
- The fence around the playground and the parking lot has been repainted.
- Currently, I am working on making two entrances less hospitable for homeless sleeping areas.

I have not been attending the Sunday services and desperately miss all of you. I pray for an end to this pandemic so


that my wife & I can again receive the blessings of Word and Sacrament at Grace and the fellowship of our beloved church family.






Moses is depicted as the one to whom God delivered the Ten Commandments on two tablets of stone. The Law declares God's will for our lives, and thus, correspondingly shows us our sin as we see how often we trespass His holy ways. On either side of Moses stand figures depicting the Gospel.

On the left side of the window is John the Baptist, who seeing Jesus, said: "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). On the right side is St. Paul, holding a sword to remind us to "take up the sword of the Spirit, the Word of God," which points us to the saving message: "Being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom 5:1).

The quatrefoils above show a Dove, symbolizing the Holy Spirit on the right, who as our advocate brings us to trust in the Lamb of God on the left.


